We offer this report to you at the end of the GPL Endowment Trust's 20th year to share the many ways the Trust benefits the library, to provide an update on the financial health of the Trust, and to ask for your continued support.

Library Benefits. We hope you enjoy this newsletter, but more importantly, we hope you have enjoyed one or more of the many delightful programs, additional services, or new furnishings the Groton Public Library has been able to offer because of the Endowment.

Financial Health. The financial statement of the Trust as of June 30, 2017, shows assets totaling \$2,554,006. The Trust invests the principal and grants up to 4% each year for programs and services for the library. In FY2017, \$68,961 was expended for grants, and \$83,050 has already been approved for FY2018.

Continued Support. The GPL Endowment Trust was established in 1998 by people like you – generous citizens and businesses in Groton and surrounding towns. The Groton Public Library cannot continue to excel without the support of its community. We wish to thank everyone who has contributed in the past and invite everyone to support this vital fund.

Adult Summer Reading Numbers Have Gone Through the Roof!

This summer, 186 participants read 945 books! Adult participation was up 85% over the past two summers and people read 17% more books! The Circulation Desk was busy all summer long!

Why was this year's Adult Summer Reading Program so successful? It may be a mix of factors:

1. The theme of "Build a Better World" seemed to resonate with our readers. For the first time, patrons of all ages earned donation money for a wonderful Massachusetts charity.

2. Reading prizes were all from the nonprofit Ten Thousand Villages, which creates income opportunities for artisans in developing countries by bringing their products and stories to our markets.

3.More programs that appealed to different age groups: Our Henna Tattoos brought in many patrons in their twenties and thirties. The new Adult & YA combined Kickoff Party and Breakout Room Challenges were also huge successes. Many people commented how nice it was to attend with their teens.



Participation more than doubled for this year's Summer Reading Challenge, "Read the World." Could you read books with some connection to each of 8 contiguous countries? Our black & white world wall map soon blossomed with colors as people filled in their literary travel locations.

This was our fourth year offering a Summer Reading Program for Adults, and it continues to grow and garner a bigger response each year! Because, after all, why should kids have all the fun? Adults like reading challenges and to win prizes for reading, too!

You Read Your Way Up to \$1,204 for Homes for Our Troops!

This year's summer reading theme was "Build a Better World" and we wanted to do our part. One of the prizes earned for reading this year was a \$1 donation to Homes For Our Troops! This top-rated Massachusetts-based charity builds and donates specially-adapted custom homes nationwide for severely injured post–9/11 Veterans, to enable them to rebuild their lives. This summer, over 1,000 people of all ages participated in GPL's Summer Reading Programs for kids, teens, and adults! For meeting certain reading goals, \$1 was "earned" for HFOT, and at the end of the summer, a check from the Endowment for \$1,204 was sent to HFOT! Great job, Groton readers!

MUSEUM PASS PROGRAM

The GPL Endowment Trust generously provides free or discounted passes to 24 area attractions, where you can enjoy the magic of butterflies in flight at the Butterfly Place, be amazed by seeing lightning being created at the Museum of Science, or delight in the adorable penguins and fascinating sea life at the New England Aquarium.

Museum passes were used 1,131 times last year, which represents a total average savings of \$28,000 for pass users! The five most popular passes were (in order): New England Aquarium, Museum of Science, Discovery Museums, Museum of Fine Arts, and the Butterfly Place.

Bus Transportation for School Visits

Seventeen elementary school classes from Florence Roche and Swallow Union (a total of 370 children) visited the library thanks to funding for bus transportation by the Endowment. First grade classes visited in October and other grades are planned for later in the school year.



SUMMER READING PROGRAM

This year's Summer Reading theme inspired and empowered children to build a better world. Not only did children from pre-readers through Grade 5 earn prizes for meeting their reading goals, they also learned that their reading could bring a positive change for others. How was this accomplished? For every child who met their reading goal for at least 3 weeks (thanks to the Endowment!) \$1.00 was donated to Homes for Our Troops.

582 children joined the Summer **Reading Program** and the Endowment funded several presenters whose workshops gave children the opportunity to plan and build a city with LEGOs®, design and create the strongest 'earthquake ready' tower, use coding to create a Minecraft world, and even make their own slime! In addition to these hands-on programs, the Endowment funded many exciting events such as Positive Spin with Brett Outchcunis. The super entertaining and upbeat Brett (affectionately known as 'Ooch') used music, magic, imagination, yo-yos, and dance to empower children to turn negative situations into positive ones.

Children also got to experience the performing arts with music events starring the Toe Jam Puppet Band, Karen K. & the Jitterbugs, Steve Blunt & Friends, and musician Matt Heaton as well as a live theatre production of Beauty and the Beast by the Hampstead Stage Co. A visit from Animal World Experience and the fascinating live Caterpillar Lab were also favorite programs. The highlight of the summer was the Tanglewood Marionettes' enchanting production of The Dragon King.



YEAR-ROUND PROGRAMS FOR CHILDREN & FAMILIES

This year we offered 256 children's programs with 4,390 kids attending!

Snow Better Time to Read! Winter Reading Program. 60 kids in grades K-4 signed up for Winter Reading in February, and 28 met the goal of reading 15 minutes for 15 days! For this, they earned a prize and a raffle ticket for either a movie pass or gift card to Barnes & Noble.


NEW! 1,000 BOOKS BEFORE KINDERGARTEN!



bestselling work of non-fiction, National Book Award-winner Egan writes the compelling true story of the single largest fire ever recorded in the United States – an apocalyptic blaze that burned an area the size of Connecticut in 36 hours in Idaho, Montana, and

Washington. No living person had ever seen a fire with the ferocity, speed, and destructive power of the Big Burn of 1910. Equally dramatic and engaging is the larger story of Teddy Roosevelt and Gifford Pinchot, and the creation myth of the U.S. Forest Service.
